- 4.a) A, intending to deceive B, falsely represents that 500 mounds of indigo are made annually at A's factory, and thereby induces B to buy the factory. What is the validity of the contract?
 - b) A by a misrepresentation leads B to believe erroneously that 750 tons of sugar is produced per annum at the factory of A. B examines the accounts of the factory, which should have disclosed, if ordinary diligence had been exercised by B, that only 500 tons had been produced. Thereafter B purchases the factory. Discuss the validity of contract.
 - c) A offer to sell his Ambassador car to B, who believes that A has only Fiat Car, agrees to buy the car. Decide the validity of the contract.
- 5.a) B promises to pay a sum of Rs. 1,00,000/- to A if A is able to swim across the Indian Ocean from Mumbai to Aden within a week. Discuss the validity of the agreement.

b) A promise to make a dead man alive with magic. Many people claimed that he have seen him making dead people alive. Satish believing this statement promised to give away all his property to A through gift deed on 25th December, 2021, as he is a messenger of God. Later on, Satish denied. Can A sue Satish for refusal to perform his part of contract?

Decide the validity of the contract.

c) A believed that the engine of his motor cycle to be in an excellent condition. A without the Motor cycle being checked in a workshop, told B that the motor cycle was in an excellent condition. On this statement, B bought the motor cycle, whose engine proved to be defective. State the nature of the statement given by A.

Section - D

6.a) A fruit parcel is delivered under a mistake to R who consumes the fruits thinking them as a birthday present. State the remedy available to the true owner.

b) Pritan pays Rs. 10,000 to Shyam, in consideration of Shyam's promising to marry Lovely, who is Pritam's daughter. Unfortunately, Lovely is dead at the time of making the promise. What is the fate of the contract and can Pritam recover Rs. 10,000 from Shyam?

- 7.a) The landlord is the owner of the shop running a sophisticated cosmetic hair dressing Saloon in Delhi. He gives on rent the said shop with the said business along with all tools, machinery, plants, fans, airconditioners, telephone, furniture and other equipment to a tenant with the stipulation that the tenant shall do the said business only under the said particular name and style. Is this agreement of lease hit by Section 27 of the Indian Contract Act? Decide.
 - b) 'A' contracted with 'B' a sugar mill owner to sell his sugarcane crop to 'B' by a fixed day for specified price. 'A' failed to deliver his sugarcane crop to 'B' at the time specified. As a consequence, 'B' was forced to procure the same from another grower "X' at the higher price than what would have been paid to 'A'. He was even prevented from honouring his contract with 'C' which he had made at the time of his contract with 'A' but had not communicated the same to 'A'. 'B' was compelled to compensate 'C'. B filed a suit against 'A' to recover damages for breach of contract. He claimed the difference between the contract price and the price paid by him to 'X', as well as the compensation paid by him to 'C'. Decide citing the relevant case laws.
